10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Three Lime Kilns, Cockburn, comprising the Coogee Lime Kilns (c.1905, reconstructed 1984 by Cockburn Cement Limited), consisting of a double kiln and

bagging floor; Tylee Lime Kiln (c.1912); and, Munster Lime Kiln (c.1920s), have cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the group is a rare remaining example in the metropolitan area of earlytwentieth century single chamber rectangular lime kilns constructed for the commercial production of quicklime;

the group was established to provide lime for the building and mining industries, both of which developed rapidly during the gold boom period of the 1890s and early 1900s, and provided an ongoing market for lime;

the group was part of the important lime burning industry in the Cockburn district in the first half of the twentieth century, and instrumental in the economic development of the area;

the group is associated with lime merchants Joseph Tylee and Thomas Briggs & R. J. Rowland, who were prominent in the industry during the 1890s to the 1930s, and with the men who found work at the kilns, in particular the Yugoslav and Italian migrants;

the kilns have the characteristic form of rectangular lime kilns and are good representative examples of the type;

the Coogee Lime Kilns has a landmark quality in its prominent location at the edge of open, level ground beside Cockburn Road, and contributes to a sense of place for the local and wider community;

the group has the potential to yield archaeological deposits which relate to the lime burning industry; and,

the group is valued by the local community for its associations with early industry and settlement in the Cockburn area attested by their inclusion in the City of Cockburn Municipal Inventory and the reconstruction of the Coogee Lime Kilns by Cockburn Cement Limited in 1984.
