10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Bridgedale, Bridgetown, comprising the house, a brick and shingle structure,

Register of Heritage Places Bridgedale, Bridgetown 1 April 2011 and the man's room, (c1868 to c1888), a single room brick and shingle structure, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons: the place contains the oldest building in Bridgetown;

the place is a landmark on the Blackwood River foreshore and, through its visual connection to the river and associated blue atlas cedar, contributes to the aesthetic qualities of the landscape and, when viewed from across the river, defines the southern entrance to the town;

the place has a close association with the Blechynden family, farming pioneers who were influential in the settlement and development of the Bridgetown district;

the place demonstrates aspects of progressive phases of development which have occurred within the township of Bridgetown from the 1860s to the present time; and,

the place is held in high esteem by the general public as an historic place
