10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Knocknagow, a single storey rendered masonry construction and Zincalume custom orb roofed residence in the Federation Queen Anne bungalow style with a belvedere and associated single storey former stables, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is significant for its elevated and prominent siting, dramatic approach from the street and as a fine Federation Queen Anne style bungalow;

with its tall belvedere, the place has a distinctive landmark quality;

the place was acquired by Mary Agnes Mulcahy in 1902, and was occupied by the Mulcahy family, prominent Fremantle and East Fremantle identities, for nearly 80 years;

it is valued by the community as evidenced by its inclusion in heritage listings and the concerns expressed when the demolition of the stables was under consideration; and,

the place is rare as one of a small number of Federation Queen Anne houses with a finely detailed tall belvedere.

The two houses and landscape developed on the Lot 2 to the south of *Knocknagow* are considered to have low significance.
