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## **10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

*All Saints' Anglican Church*, a single-storey auditory plan Donnybrook stone and iron building, with a steep, parapeted gabled roof in the Federation Gothic style, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is a fine example of the Federation Gothic style of architecture applied in a rural context. The place has a high level of integrity and authenticity;

the place has important associations with the Donnybrook stone industry and is one of a small group of prominent civic buildings in the State that also feature Donnybrook stone. The place is important to the history of the town of Donnybrook, being the oldest public building in Donnybrook; the place has high rarity value as one of a few surviving rural buildings featuring Donnybrook stone and is the only Anglican Church constructed of Donnybrook stone in the South West region;

the place was designed by the architect, Augustine Benedict Rieusset;

the place has considerable social value for its continuous function as an Anglican Church since 1906, and for its striking contribution to the streetscape and broader townscape of Donnybrook which contributes to the community's sense of place; and,

the place contributes to our understanding of the Anglican Church in Western Australia, and is associated with those sections of the community who used the place, including past and present pastors, parish members and their families.

The hall at the rear of the church has little heritage significance.
