10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Dalkeith House, a two-storey brick and limestone building in the Federation Queen Anne style, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is an excellent and substantially intact example of a mansion built in the Federation Queen Anne style, constructed in the centre of Fremantle during the period of prosperity that accompanied the gold boom;

the place is important for the fine aesthetic characteristics imparted by the richly worked timber and cast iron embellishments of the verandahs and the moulded string courses; the place is important for its landmark qualities, being close to the intersection of High and Parry streets and its exposure by the grassed open reserve;

the place, built for James Gallop jnr., a well known and successful market gardener, was designed by O. N. Nicholson, a prominent Fremantle architect; and,

the place is representative of opulent houses built around the turnof-the-twentieth century reflecting the prosperity of the gold rush economy.

The stables, built c. 1904, are on a separate strata title and are not included in the assessment.
