10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Kwinana Signal Box, an elevated two-storey, timber framed, asbestos clad structure based on a steel support, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is one of the few surviving signal cabins in Western Australia and the only one still operational and, as such, is representative of the multitude of signal cabins that were once common across the Western Australian Government Railways system;

the place demonstrates technological change in signalling methods and contains a diverse range of technologies, from the 1896 40 lever McKenzie and Holland No. 9 interlocking lever frame to the late 20th century electrical minimise panel;

the place is the only railway site with ten semaphore signal posts in the yard as part of the signalling technology associated with the lever frame in WA;

the place has historic links with the development of the Kwinana Industrial Area and with the former Eastern Railway due to its previous location at Koojedda;

the place demonstrates a previous way of life when the railways were a major form of transport for goods and passengers at the beginning of the twentieth century; and

the place has landmark value emphasized by its location adjacent to a major road.

Adjacent to the *Kwinana Signal Box* is a modern building housing relay equipment for the electronic panels and a small building housing a standby power plant. Both are essential to its current use, yet neither is considered to be of heritage significance. The relay components are a part of the modern signalling technology.
