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10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

*Gingin Railway Station & Quarters*, a brick and rendered building in the style of an English station with attached stationmaster's quarters, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

  - the place is unique as the only Midland Railway Company station that retains the majority of its original form;
  - the place is a good example of a Victorian era railway building in the Vernacular style;
  - the place was constructed by prominent builder, innovative farmer and developer Friedrich Wilhelm Gustav Liebe, and is associated with Edward Keane, a leading railway builder;

the place was one of the first railway stations built by the Midland Railway Company for its new line from Midland Junction to Walkaway; and,

the place was part of the development of the Midland-Walkaway Railway, which provided the essential transport system for pastoral and agricultural development in the region.
